The team would like to take this opportunity to express their appreciation to Miss. Beals for the time and coaching she gave the team.

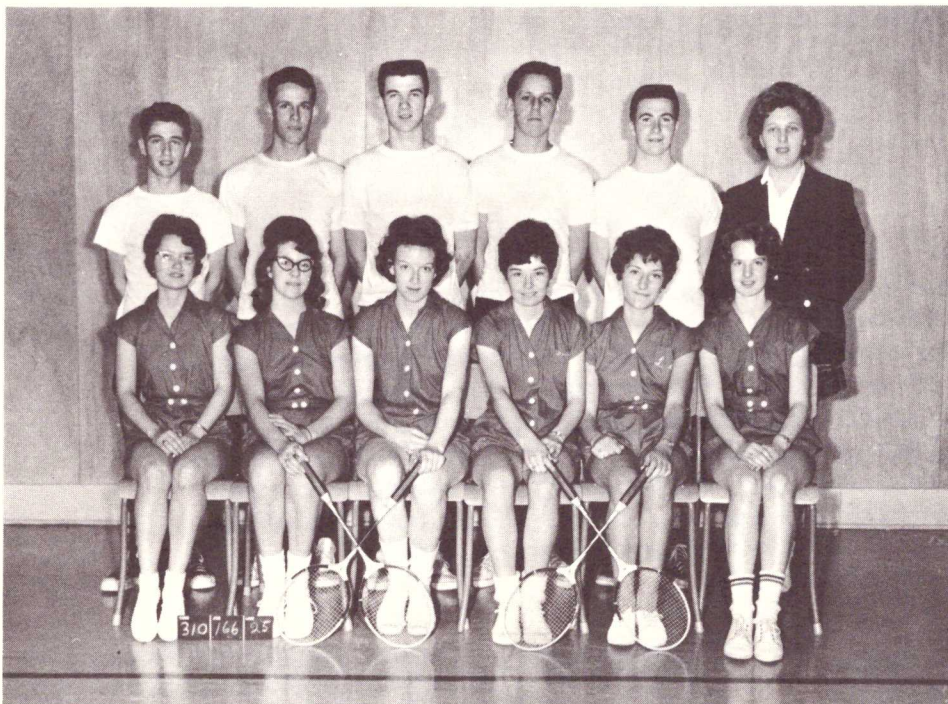

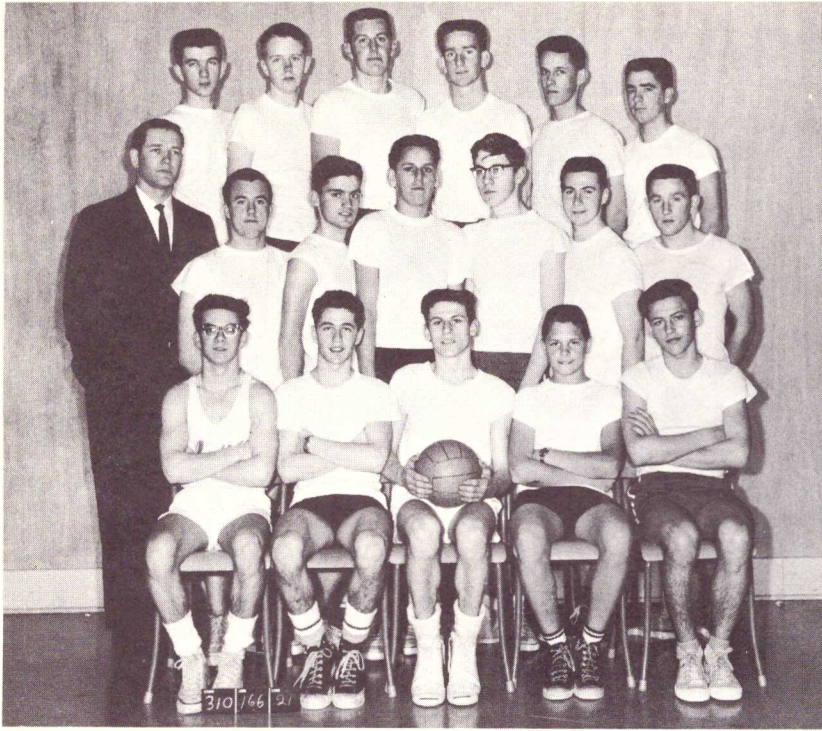

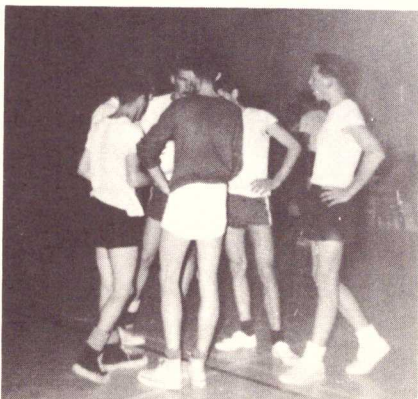
' A ' Volleyball

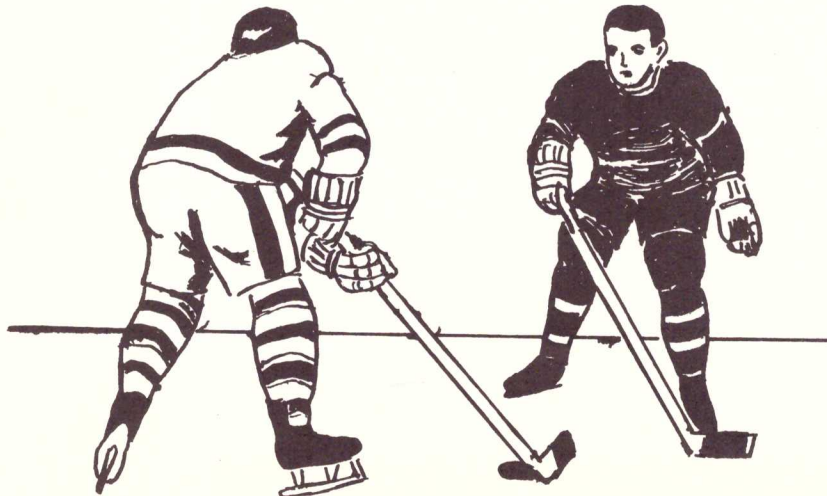

For the good of all men everywhere.

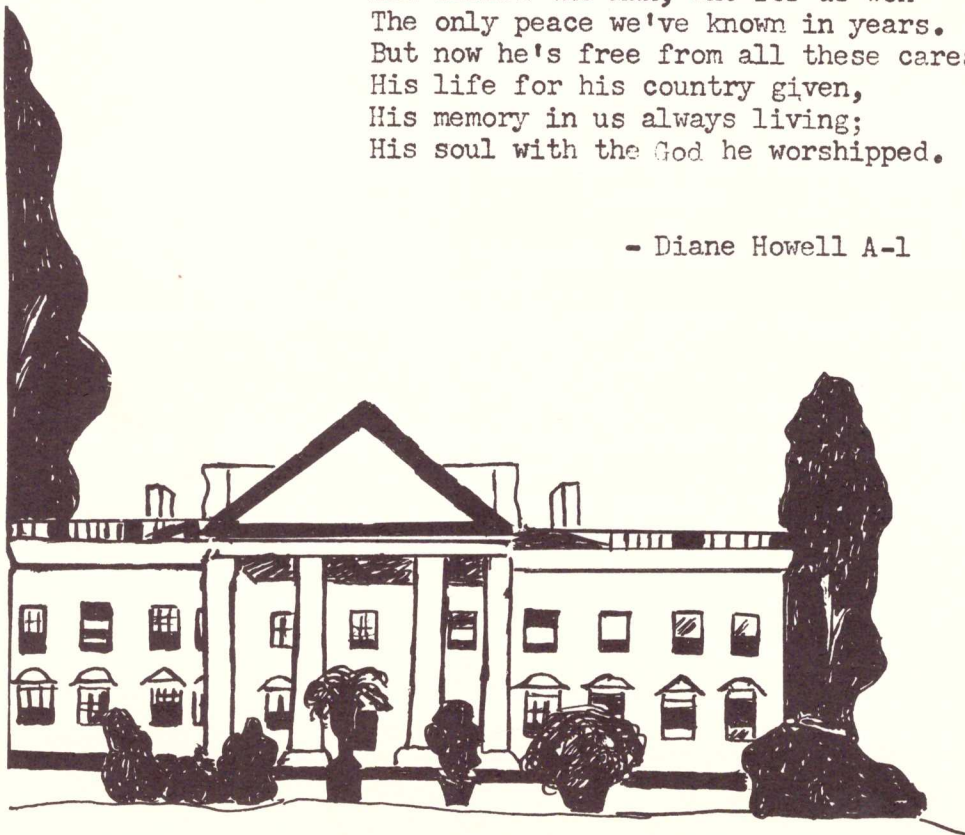
He was the youngest President.

As the power of nuclear war.

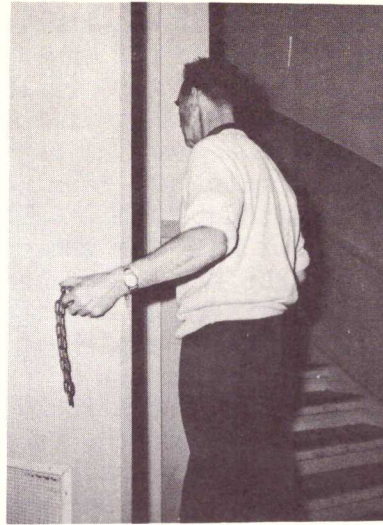
And now he's dead.
