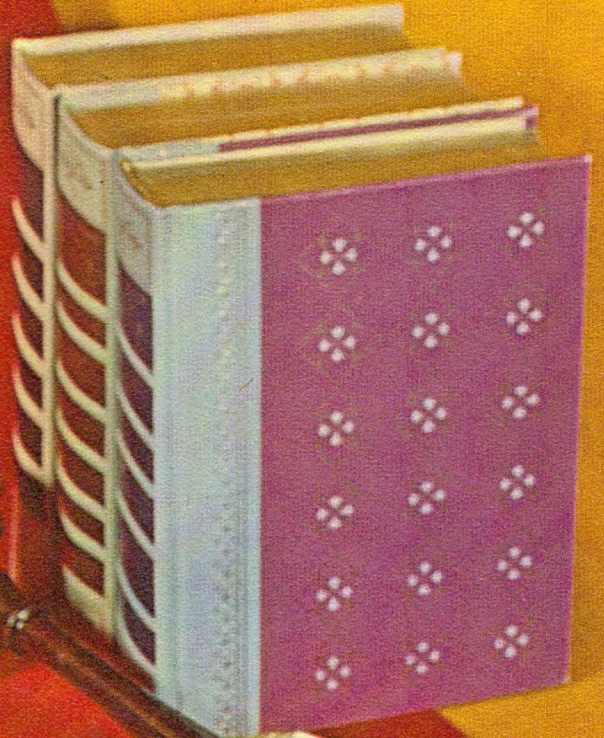
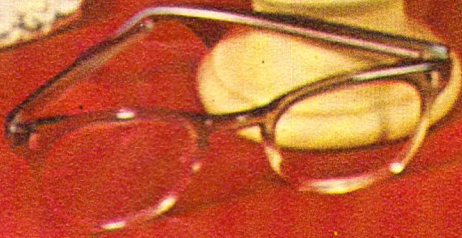

The end of our school year brings a quickening of activities that provides lasting memories of busy but pleasant days, thus ending a very successful year.

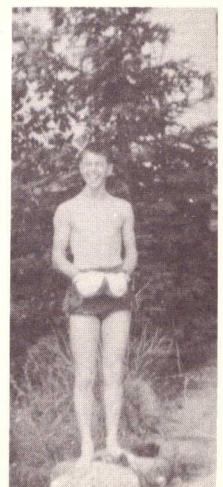
Through trial and error we have moved on, trying to fulfill our duties for the year.

The athletic teams and their coaches deserve praise for their efforts. Although not excelling in sports, we like to think of the old saying "If you loose with a smile, then you're still a winner."

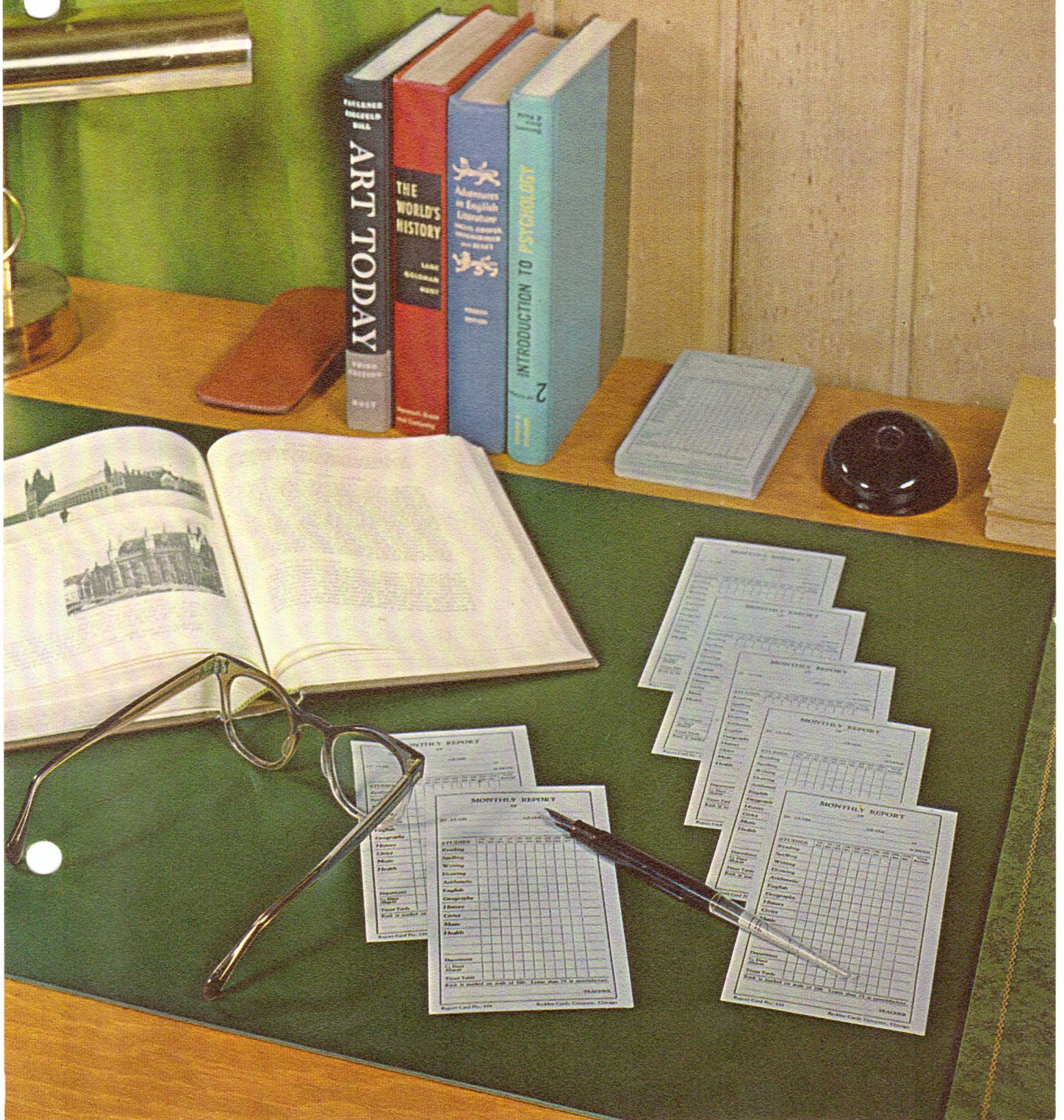

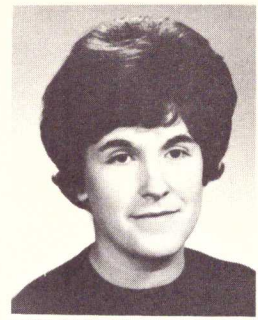
