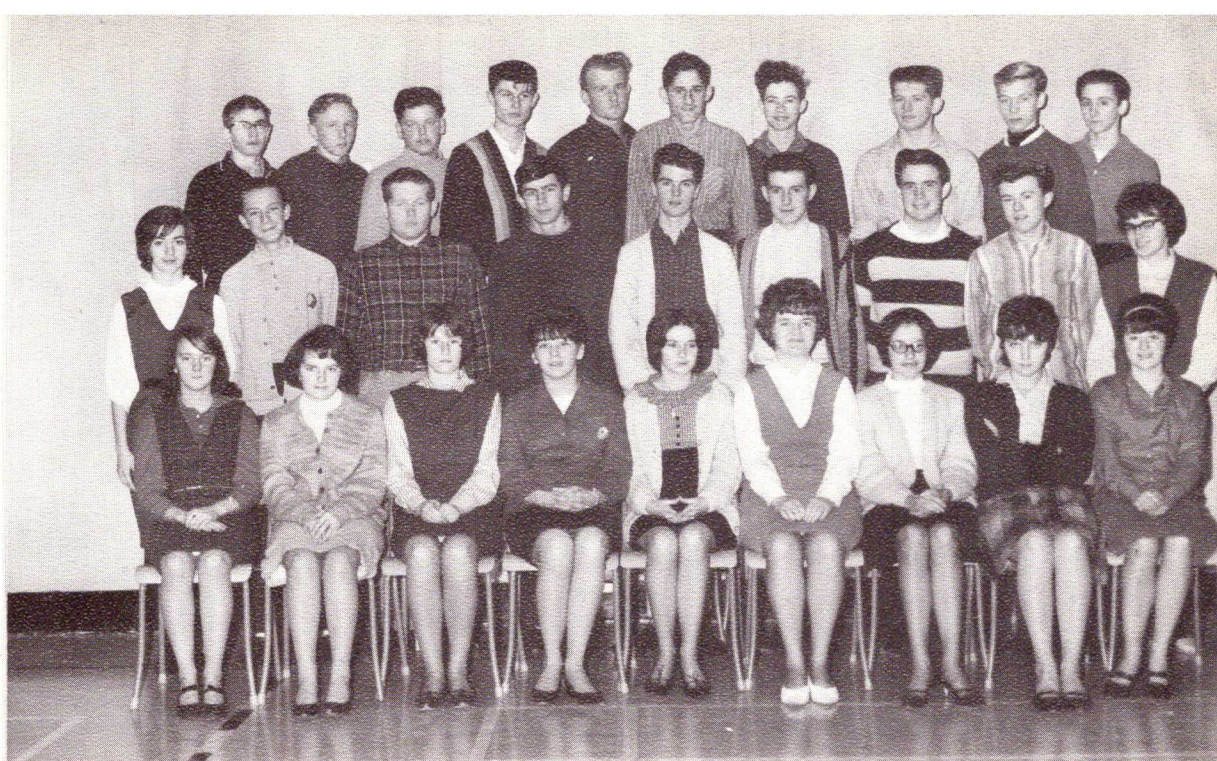


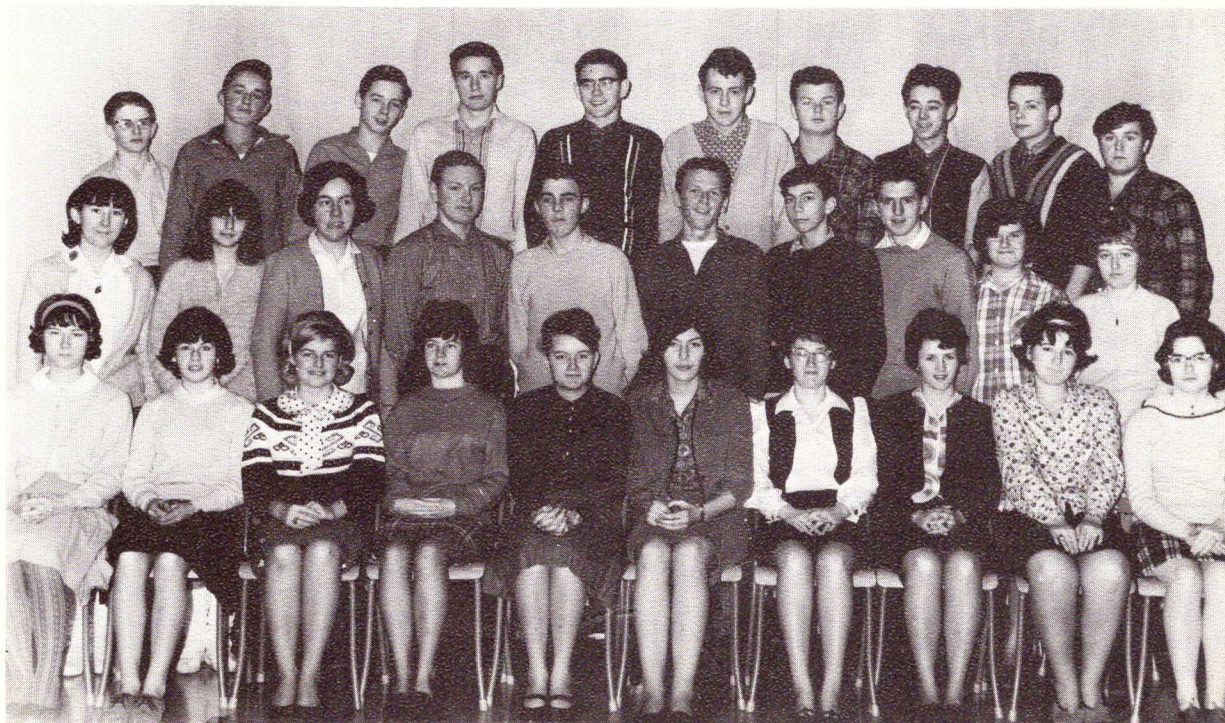

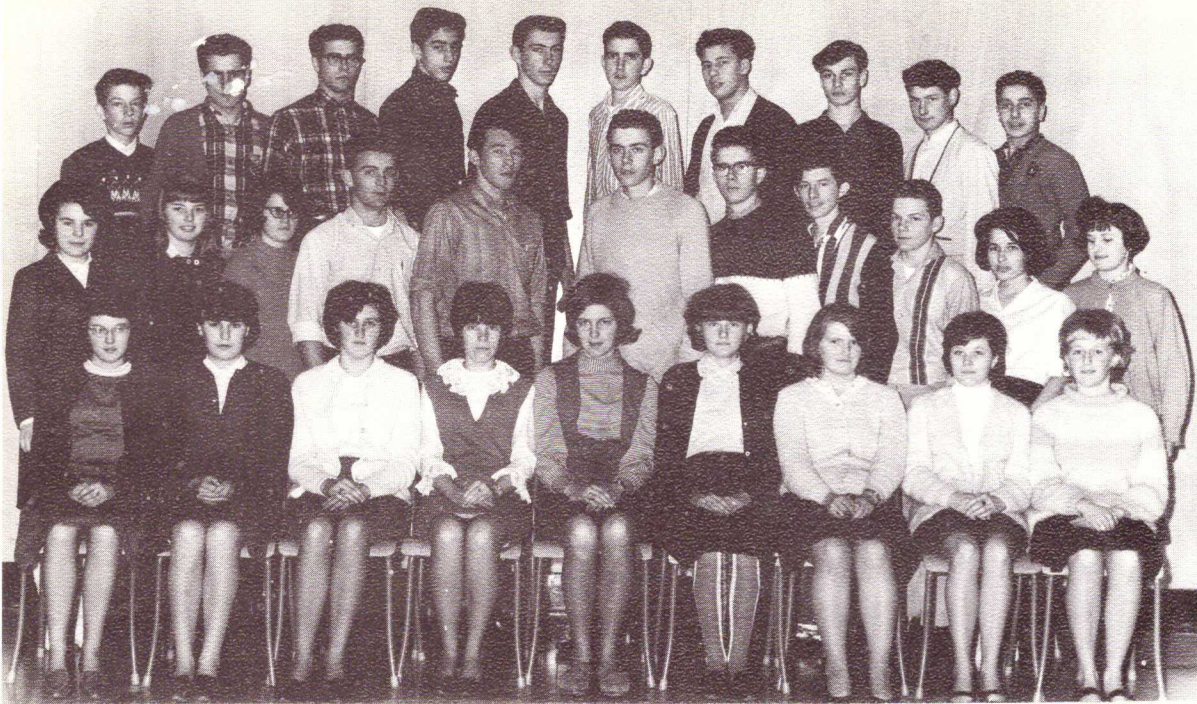

Our boys participated in murderball and the girls took part in basketball.

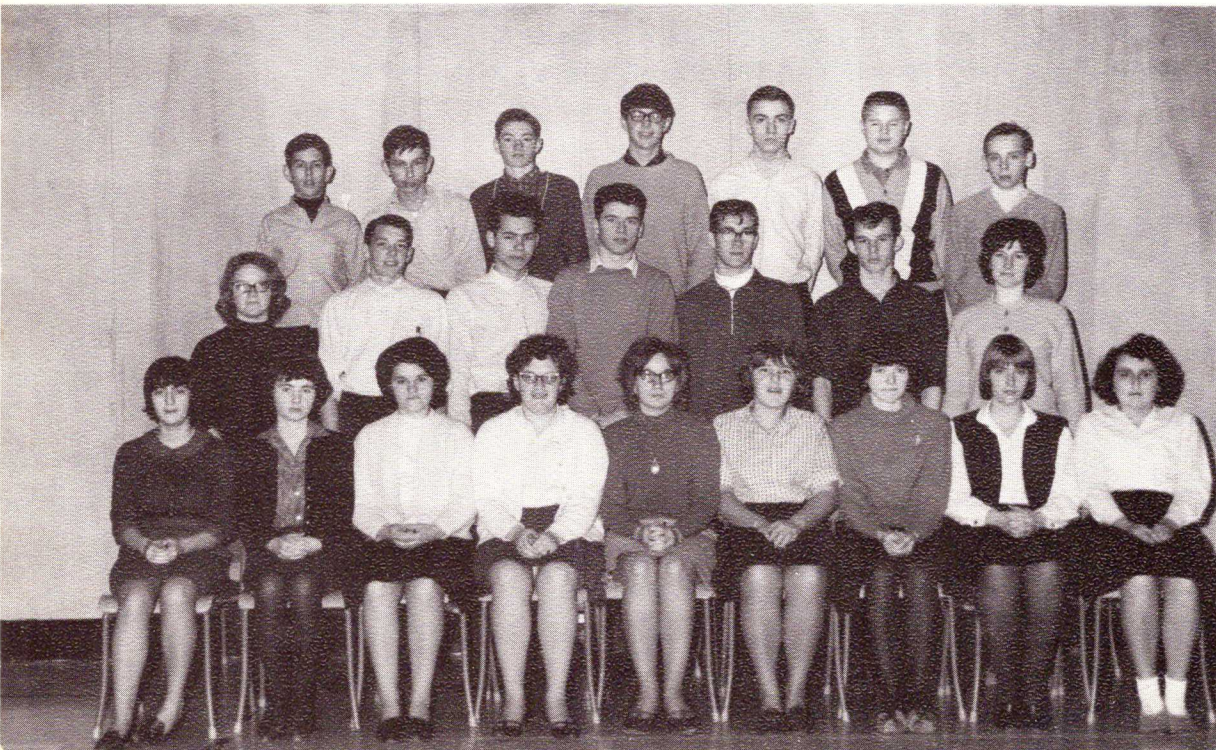

splash parties, and a scavenger hunt. . . then the five days of winter carnival came to a close with the Carnival dance and the

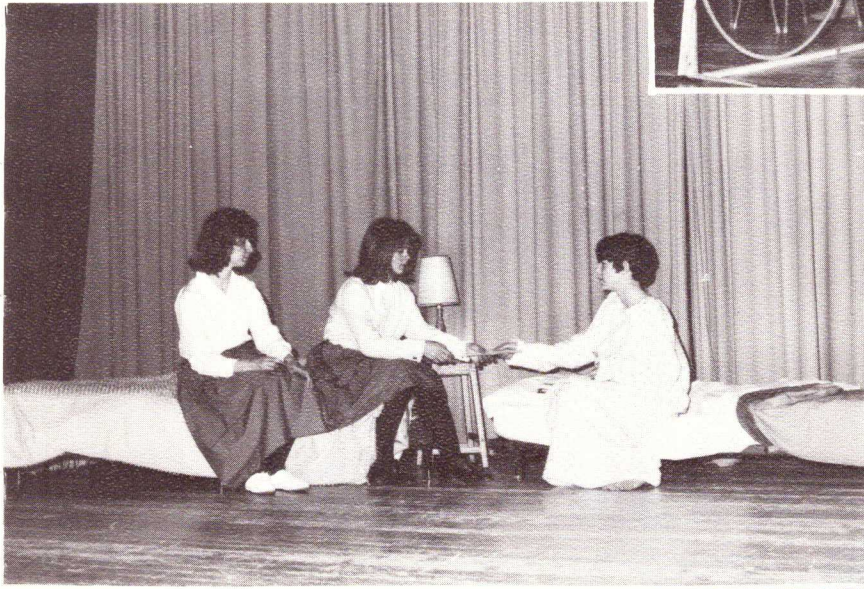
crowning of our king and queen. From the first day of the carnival, Feb. 14, through to the last day Feb. 18 the carnival was fun.
